The importance of accessing paid work as a source of gendered inequalities in well-being.

The importance of institutions and public policies in determining women and men well-being and the institutional potential to offset gender inequalities in this regard.

The role of social movements for change addressing sustainable human well-being and its gender inequalities.

The conceptualisation, definition and measurement of well-being, and particularly gender-differences in well-being and what are the strengths and weaknesses of the capability approach in this perspective.
