IN ACADEMIA

Despite many innovative equal opportunity measures, the proverbial "glass ceiling" still prevails in Swiss universities. 
Professor of Psychology and Women's Studies at the University of Michigan, she has lead many longitudinal studies of women's careers and personality development in different occupational contexts.

Three hours to convince senior scholars that they might just be influenced by gender stereotypes...

Women academics are often portrayed as lacking in ambition, overwhelmed with childcare responsibilities, and too concerned with teaching, rather than research. All these things may explain their stunted careers, but so might the role of academic (male) gatekeepers. Perhaps their stereotypes influence the ability of women to "match" the ideal image of a potential professor or to fit in with expectations about how a "high potential" post-doc should behave...

Abigail Stewart and Virginia Valian will lead this workshop in each of the two host universities of the NCCR LIVES (UNIL & UNIGE), offering senior academics and management the opportunity to critically explore their own beliefs and practices.

"WHY SO SLOW?" BY VIRGINIA VALIAN

With an introduction by Franciska Krings and Dominique Arlettaz, respectively vice-rector and rector of UNIL.

In a book first published in 1998, which remains highly topical, Virginia Valian uses concepts and data from psychology, sociology and economics to explain why so few women occupy positions of power and prestige.

Her conference will present a summary of her results and show how invisible factors hamper women's career progress. According to the author, all of us adhere to implicit gender norms, which lead to differences in behaviour, perception, and expectations in men and women.

These imbalances accumulate to the advantage of men, at the expense of women, and this is particularly true in the academic environment.
