Introduction: Project, Participants and the Protests

This manual will guide you through the collaborative research project "Caught in the Act of Protest: Contextualizing Contestation" (CCC). The project consists of nine European countries, namely: Belgium, Czech Republic, Italy, Mexico, The Netherlands, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom. Table 1 (in page 6) presents the country teams, partners and their affiliation.

Table 3 displays the list of the demonstrations, the issue of the demonstrations, and a response rate. Between 2009 and the fall of 2013, 17,904 participants in 92 protest demonstrations were surveyed. A total of 60,095 postal surveys were distributed. The dataset includes thirteen demonstrations in the Netherlands, twelve in the United Kingdom and Czech Republic, eleven in Spain, ten in Sweden, nine in Belgium and Italy, eight in Switzerland and Mexico. The largest group of demonstrations deals with budget cuts, austerity measures, and the banking crisis (N=23). This group is followed by May Day events (N=17); climate change/energy demonstrations (N=10); protests on reforms of the political system (nationalism, changing democratic rules, justice, the reform of the state/EU) (N=16); antiracist/antifascist events (N=4); feminist demonstrations (N=3); anti-abortion (N=1), LGBT rights (N=9) peace events/veggie parades (N=3), protests against crime or violence and mafia (N=4), commemoration (N=1) academic issues (N=1). The 92 demonstrations display a broad variety of causes, issues, movements, and countries which presents a tough assessment for the method.

The aim of the research

The aim of the project is to increase our understanding of the dynamics of protest: Who are the people that take part in protest demonstrations, why do they participate, how they are mobilized, and how all this is influenced by contextual variation.

Crucial to this project is its comparative design. This design bares on the combination of several hierarchically related context layers:

- 1. National Context (NC), i.e. the national political system in which demonstrations are staged;
- 2. *General Mobilizing Context* (GMC), i.e. the demand and supply of protest, protest culture in a country in general regardless of the issue;
- 3. *Issue-Specific Mobilizing Context* (IMC), i.e. the specific demand and supply of protest, and the specific techniques of mobilization in a country specifically regarding the protest issue at stake;
- 4. Demonstration (Demo), i.e. the characteristics of the demonstration;
- 5. and relates this to characteristics of the *protestors*.

The central tenet of this study is that a national context generates a general and a specific mobilizing context; that the interaction of nation and mobilizing contexts produces a specific type of demonstration; that a specific type of demonstration brings a specific group of protestors into the streets. We assume that the composition of the group of protestors, their motives and the way they are mobilized result from the interaction of national context, general and issuespecific mobilizing context, and type of demonstration (see Figure 1 and Table 2). Figure 1: Overview Contextual Layers



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Methodology

Between 2009 and 2013 each collaborating team collected data on demonstrations on a broad variety of issues.

Each national team used the same core questionnaire (the Golden Standard), containing a fixed set of questions in a fixed sequence as agreed upon by all teams. However, each team had the opportunity to include an individual optional module (OM) encompassing questions of their own interest.

In order to obtain reliable, valid and comparable findings we employ a protest survey method developed and tested by Walgrave and his colleagues (University of Antwerp). This method is described in more detail in Chapter 1: Protest surveys: Procedures, Practicalities, Problems. Next to the individual level data, context data on countries, on mobilizing contexts, and on the demonstrations was gathered.

Outline CCC-Manual

In chapter 1 we highlight the protest survey design: we explain the method of protest surveying, give a practical overview of such an endeavor.

In chapter 2 we further elaborate on the method of surveying, particularly focusing on the questionnaires, as well as selection and response bias. Moreover, we also explain the methods of the analyses of the media and social class.

Chapter 3 provides the overview of the research output: published articles, book chapters, and work in progress.

Chapter 4 presents a list of variables (names and labels).

The national contextual data (POS) is outlined in chapter 5.

In chapter 6 we overview the adaptations of questionnaires that were made during the project period.

In the annexes you can find all the questionnaires that were filled in by the respondents of demonstrations, including optional modules. We also add the core and F2F questionnaires in native languages.


Chapter 1: The protest survey design

In this chapter we will discuss the levels of analysis, the actors involved in the survey, the structure of the data, and the procedures of surveying.

There were three stages of collecting data: (A) *before* the demonstration; (B) *during* the demonstration and (C) *after* the demonstration. The timeline data gathering process is pictured in Figure 2.

In overall, five actors involved in the demonstration were surveyed: 1) organizers; 2) the police; 3) demonstrators; 4) interviewers; 5) pointers. The types of surveys and the actors are discussed below.

Figure 2. Timeline data gathering process



In the **stage A** (before the demonstration) the **organizations** that staged the demonstration were contacted (telephone interview; at least two weeks before the demonstration). Based on the interview and their website information, two documents were filled in:

- 1. Factsheet Organizations (A Fact Org)
- 2. Questionnaire Organizations before demo (A_Quest_Org).

Maximum five organizers were addressed.

Moreover, in the stage A, the **police** was contacted and surveyed (telephone interview; at least two weeks before the demonstration):

3. Questionnaire Police (before demo): A Quest Police.

The **stage B** marks gathering data during the demonstration. The distinct methods used for demonstration will be explained in more detail in the section *Procedures* **of surveying**

In this stage during the demonstration, four documents were filled in (by the researcher and by the respondents):

- 1. Core questionnaire: B_Quest_Core. These are postal surveys that were distributed to the **demonstrators** during the demonstration and returned later by post.
- 2. Face-to-Face questionnaire: B_Quest_F2F. The questionnaire was aimed at surveying the **demonstrators** on spot during the demonstration.
- 3. Survey Interviewer questionnaire: B_Quest_Interviewers. Information on behalf of the **interviewers** in this questionnaire was filled in.
- 4. Factsheet During Demonstration: B_Fact_Demo. Information about the **demonstration** filled in by the pointer.

Finally in the **stage C** the last pieces of data with regard to the covered protest demonstration was gathered. In overall, 5 documents were filled out:

- 1. Questionnaire Organizations (after demo): C_Quest_Org. Analogically, the organizations that staged the demonstration, were re-contacted for a telephone interview after the demonstration (in the week after the demo).
- Questionnaire Police (after demo): C_Quest_Police. The police was re-contacted and interviewed by telephone (or e-mail) after the demonstration (in the week after the demo).
- 3. Factsheet Pointer: C_Fact_Pointer. Information about the demonstration was filled in by the pointer just after the demonstration.
- 4. Factsheet Issue-Specific Mobilization context: C_Fact_IMC. The questionnaire contains contextual data which was filled in by the team researcher.
- 5. Factsheet Media: C_Fact_Media. The questionnaire contains media research data which was filled in by the team researcher. More about the sampling procedure in Chapter 2 (section: *Media analysis*)

Additionally, the secondary contextual data about each country (except for Mexico) where demonstrations took place was gathered (POS). The central tenet of this study is that a specific national context generates a specific mobilizing context; that the interaction of nation and mobilizing context produces a specific type of demonstration; that a specific type of demonstration brings a specific group of protestors into the streets. We assume that the composition of the group of protestors, their motives and the way they are mobilized result from the interaction of national context, mobilizing context, and type of demonstration. Table 4 presents the overview of the multilevel data of the CCC project.

Procedures of surveying

Data handling in comparative research requires methods that guarantee comparability of the data. Key to such methods, next to the use of standardized questionnaires, is the application of:

- standardized sampling procedures;
- standardized ways of dealing with non-response.

Before getting into the method in more detail, it is important to note a few things. Pervading the demonstration with a team of surveyors and spreading them throughout the demonstration in a way that every respondent gets an equal chance of being selected can be quite straightforward, but very often this is not the case. Some demonstrations elapse in a relatively orderly way, but every so often they are more like early-morning station halls with people coming from different ways and heading for different directions. Some demonstrations are very easily accessed, but others are less so, as they can be too noisy, rowdy and vicious to get your interviewers to do their job properly, or on the other hand very serene and emotional, making their presence somewhat awkward and seemingly inappropriate. Some demonstrations are of a good size to be covered, others are way too large to get a decent sample, or way too small, which adds to the interviewers' visibility to too large a degree. Finally, as the method of protest surveying, evidently, serves to interview protesters who principally participate to be able to vent their concern, discontent or worry, some of them will feel happy with being surveyed as they perceive it as an extra channel to find expression for their concerns, but others will find the presence of 'ivory tower' scholars observing and studying their grievances inappropriate or just plainly ridiculous.

All this to say that conducting protest surveys is very often not evident, and that the fieldwork method and procedures described below should be interpreted as a **methodological toolbox** containing all kinds of **guidelines** enabling you to get an optimal sample of demonstrators. Every demonstration is unique and often faces the researcher with unique problems which can only be dealt with *ad hoc*. However, two the most important survey guiding principles were applied:

- Always keeping the selection of the respondents and the actual interviewing/handing over of the questionnaires separated;
- Making sure that every demonstrator has an equal likelihood of being selected.

Throughout the remainder of this document, we will explain the method of protest surveying, give a practical overview of the course of such an endeavor, and give an overview of problems and drawbacks often or sporadically encountered during the process.

Standardized sampling procedure

The standardized sampling procedure aims at guaranteeing that each participant in the demonstration has the same likelihood of being sampled. Demonstrations are not unstructured masses and researchers have to agree on a device that guarantees a reasonable degree of

representativeness of the sample of protesters. Obviously, the device depends on the 'lay-out' of the area (for example, broad avenues in Brussels or a square in Amsterdam) and whether the demonstration is 'moving' or 'static'. The following two procedures are ways of how this must be accomplished. Once more: sampling procedures may be slightly adapted for every single demonstration and if needed tailored to circumstances. Demonstrations are 'living' things, and some are easily covered, but for others getting a good sample is a very tough job.

The most crucial element of a successful protest survey endeavor is the division of labor between those selecting/pointing and those approaching participants. Pointers are essential, as they are more prone to select protesters independently of their own inclination to approach them. Earlier tests where interviewers could select their own respondents indicate that they will be much more inclined to approach the more approachable (see Walgrave and Verhulst 2011^2). The pointers, who are preferably the more experienced members of the protest survey team, also have the responsibility to make the ad-hoc estimation of the size of the demonstration and thus to decide on the survey procedure. They are also the ones who guide and monitor their interviewers through the entire process, who take the decisions when things start going wrong, who keep their eyes open to be able to describe the 'look and feel' of the demonstration afterwards. To be short: pointers are crucial.

Moving demonstration in a broad avenue

This method draws on moving and counting pointers each directing a group of interviewers. Pointers count rows to ensure a fair dispersion of questionnaires over the marching column, giving every demonstrator an equal chance to be singled out to be interviewed. The two (or more) pointers, each accompanied by a team of questionnaire distributors/interviewers, count the rows of participants in the moving cortege, selecting every n-th row, to ensure that the same number of rows is skipped throughout the demonstration, so that the whole procession is covered. In an ideal situation, every pointer supervises about four interviewers. The procedure is meant to guarantee that all groups of demonstrators, no matter whether their members prefer to walk in the first part of a march or as one of the last groups (this issue is also linked to the questions of visibility of a group in a march), have an equal chance to be part of the sample.

More concretely, one group of pointer + interviewers groups starts at the first row of demonstrators in the march and then gradually descends (that is: goes "downward" in the march), counting, selecting and skipping rows till they arrive at the middle of the moving march. While interviewers are in the selected row to have an interview or to hand out a questionnaire, the pointer walks along with the march at the march's pace so to not let rows pass by and so that interviewers find their pointer back easily. The other group of pointer and distributors, the sporty ones (as they have to overtake the marching crowd up until the middle), start at the end and gradually work their way up to the head of the march (that is: they move "upward" in the march). Again, pointers, when their interviewers are busy in the rows, walk along with the




Figure 3. Procedure in moving demonstration

march at the same pace as the demonstrators. Each time a row is selected by the pointer, the pointer selects every n-th person in that row and the interviewer should hand out a questionnaire to this individual (or interview him/her orally first). Ideally, alternatively a person at the left side, at the right side, and in the middle of a row is selected, again taking into account that some participants will prefer to march at the margins or in the center of the crowd. Figure 3 displays the sampling procedure graphically.

Static demonstration at a square






Figure 4. Static demonstration on a square

To fit the environmental circumstances of a protest event taking place on a square instead of a broad avenue, the method of Walgrave and colleagues is modified (see Figure 4). To give every protester an equal likelihood to be selected for the study, interviewers are equally distributed around the square where the protest event starts. Interviewers and pointers (which should be very clearly visible as they are amidst the crowd) instruct their interviewers to conduct an interview/hand out a questionnaire at the outer circle followed by an interview/handing out a questionnaire 2 steps from the outer circle in the direction of the centre of the square the following interview is conducted/questionnaire is handed out another 4 steps further in the direction of the centre of the square and so on (i.e. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 etc.). Hence, the number of steps in between increases as to control for the fact that due to the circular shape the number of people decreases as a function of the distance to the centre. The pointer should send out interviewers to the left and the right of the 'line' he is following, and interviewers should be spread more to the left and right at the edge of the crowd than in the centre (see the $\leftarrow \rightarrow$ arrows in the graph below). Depending on the number of pointers you have and the density of the crowd you decide how many "slices" each pointers needs to cover.

Of course, groups of interviewers/pointers can start 'back-to-back' at the centre of the square, spreading themselves from the centre to the periphery of the crowd, then diminishing the amount of steps towards the edges.

Finally, when the crowd is in a broad avenue or rectangular squares the 'bars' method seem to work rather well. Therefore the area is divided into several 'bars' or lines (see Figure 5). The pointers go through the crowd in the middle of their line and send out interviewers to the left and the right. Obviously, interviewers come back after each interview to their pointers. At the same time, other interviewers start the same procedure at other such bars, so that the crowd can be fully covered. Half of the groups goes from left to right, the other half goes from the right to the left.

Chapter 2: Methodology

In this chapter we discuss the methodology of gathering data and the problems of selection bias.

Questionnaires

The questionnaires were conceived as A5, double-sided-booklets with a colored cover with the 'name' and date of the demonstration on it. Each included a common core questionnaire containing identical questions for all demonstrations in a fixed sequence, and an (optional) one-page module with questions on personal research interests.

At every demonstration, we used two types of booklets: survey booklets, and survey booklets containing a separate, attached face-to-face interview sheet. These latter ones were to test for non-response bias. The booklets were all numbered, and the face-to-face sheet had an identical number as the booklet it was associated with (we had the face-to-face page stapled in the middle of the questionnaire, so it could be filled out in, and afterwards torn out of the booklet). After having completed the face-to-face interview (3.5 minutes, 8 questions), the respondent was asked to fill in some more questions at home, and was given the linked booklet and the pre-stamped envelope. The average number of handed-out questionnaires was 653. The average number of face-to-face interviews per demonstration was 130.

F2F and OM data for all demonstrations in Mexico and Second Student National Demo demonstration in London are not available.

In sum, for every six questionnaires handed out, one (in average) was accompanied by a face-to-face interview. Pointers kept track of the distributing postal surveys or executing F2F-interviews.

The core postal survey contained the core questionnaire (which was a standard one for all protests) and an optional module. Each country team could decide themselves what questions to include in the optional module for a demonstration. The idea behind this was to insure at least the minimal flexibility of surveying and allow the researchers to add the survey questions of their own research interests. Therefore all optional modules for all demonstrations are different.

Selection and response bias

This section refers to the paper of S. Walgrave and J. Verhulst 2011³.

The general survey method literature highlights several sources of response problems which apply to protest surveys as well (see e.g. Dillman 2000⁴; Lynn and Clarke 2002⁵; Singer 2006⁶). Broadly speaking, the first problem is that aimed for respondents in the probability sample are not reached; this is called noncontact (e.g., Targeted respondents do not pick up the phone or do not open the door).

Second, when potential respondents are reached, they may refuse to collaborate. This refusal can be immediate, meaning that respondents refuse to accept a questionnaire, or it can be delayed, meaning that respondents accept a questionnaire but do not complete it. Third, refusal may lead to refusal bias—i.e., a systematic difference between the population and the actual sample. Noncontact and immediate or delayed refusal are only potential sources of bias since they do not necessarily lead to differences between the population and the sample. High levels of noncontact and refusal do tend to increase the chance of systematic differences between population and sample (Keeter et al. 2000⁷), but recent studies found that the relationship between refusal rates and refusal bias is rather weak (Groves and Peytcheva 2008⁸).

Suffering from the same response problems as any other kind of survey, this protest survey design has particular features that cause it to be different from other surveys. First, the population is unknown yet well-defined. All participants in a protest event form the population but there is no information regarding who these individuals are. Samples cannot be compared with known characteristics of the population, nor are there lists of participants from which random samples can be drawn. Second, demonstrations are temporary and short-lived events. Sampling and interviewing must be accomplished under recognizable time pressure. To maximize short time use protest surveys are generally carried out by large teams of interviewers. Third, demonstrations are social phenomena and participants can be cheerful, wild, angry, or aggressive. Adequately addressing participants can pose as a challenge. Often, circumstances are far from ideal to approach and talk to people, to ask them questions, or to convince them to take home a questionnaire. Fourth and finally, the design does not allow sending respondents reminders as a means to convincing them to collaborate, nor is there the option of pre-notification to prepare them for the interview. Because of the accumulation of all these nonconventional challenges and caveats, there are good reasons to systematically test the quality of the data generated by the protest survey design.

Both across issues and across nations we can compare face-to-face interviews with mail-in

surveys. With response rates of face-to-face interviews close to 100 percent, we consider this a benchmark to test the response bias of the mail-in surveys with response rates of about 30 percent. The comparison is not entirely unproblematic, however, as face-to-face sampling in the demonstrations was less "random" and "systematic" than the mail-in sampling procedure. Thus, while nonresponse is problematic for mail-in surveys, the sampling for face-to-face surveys is imperfect due to interviewer selection bias.

Media analysis

In each country, the *two main broadsheets* and the *two main popular newspapers* are covered in the media analyses. All analyses was done using online search databases (Lexis-Nexis or alike). *Only the 'news' and economical* sections were analyzed (so not culture, leisure, tv, sports,...).

All keyword counts were done on a *weekly* basis. Issue searches were done covering a period from twelve weeks before to four weeks after the demonstration. Demonstration searches were performed four weeks before and four weeks after the demonstration. The day of the *demonstration is considered 'point 0'*. Seven days before that is point '-1'; fourteen days before point '-2' etc., up to point '-12' and point ('+4') on the other end, which is 28 days after the demonstration.

To be able to *benchmark* the national numbers, a one-time *national average number of weekly articles* was calculated. More specifically: the total amount of articles (again, no TV, culture, leisure and sports sections. Only the front page, and the domestic news-, foreign and international news-, and economic news section are taken into account) in the four newspapers for four random weeks was counted. The total average of these week totals as the national newspaper coverage benchmark.

Regarding the *general Issue* search term:

- The theme of the demonstration was adjusted to one or more general search terms (max 5, in separate analyses). Analyses using this/these generic search term(s) then were used to compare with other demonstration in the database.
- The used search terms were entered in the original language and an English translation provided.
- E.g.: on a labor union demonstration on a corporate closedown, one could use search terms like: corporate closedown(s) layoffs unemployment economic crisis.
- E.g.: on a climate change demonstration, one general search term could suffice: Climate.

Demonstration-specific-issue search term:

- This gauges for the specific issue of the demonstration. Here, several search terms were used simultaneously using Boolean operators.
- E.g.: climate change OR climate OR global warming OR Copenhagen summit OR ...

Specific demonstration search term:

- The demonstration-specific issue search term + 'demonstration OR manifestation OR rally OR ... OR ...
- E.g.: 'climate change OR climate OR Copenhagen summit' AND 'demonstration OR rally'.
- A personal (or group-decided) tone measure of the total of articles on the demonstration was given. This was only a subjective (group's) opinion.

General issue protest event analysis

- The general issue search term + 'demonstration OR manifestation OR rally OR ...'. If more than one general issue search term was used before, they were combined in one.
- E.g.: 'climate' AND 'demonstration OR rally'.

Social status

Social class of the respondents is measured in three different ways⁹. Two of these measurements result from later years' developments of occupation-oriented class analysis, in which class is conceptualized according to the individual's position on the labor market. These are the European Socio-economic Classification (ESeC) and the Oesch scheme (developed by the Swiss political sociologist Daniel Oesch), which are both based on the British sociologist John Goldthorpe's mostly Weber-inspired class-scheme. While these first two conceptualizations of class are grounded in the 'objective' conditions of the labor market, the third is focusing on the 'subjective' side of class, measuring individuals' self-categorization in terms of class—their 'class identity'.

The Goldthorpe scheme, which is foremost based on Weber's class theory, defines class positions on the basis of employment relations. First of all, a basic distinction is made between employers, the self-employed and employees. Since the vast majority of the population in most developed countries belongs to the latter category, this is further subdivided based on the form of the employment contract. There are two ideal contract types: the service contract and the labor contract; in between one can find intermediate forms. Two aspects of the employment relation create the distinction between service and labor contract: whether the work performed is easy to monitor, and the degree of specificity that characterize human assets (e.g. skills and expertise). The labor contract is characterized by low asset specificity, i.e. one worker may easily be exchanged for another, and work is easily supervised. The service contract is on the opposite side of the scale, and entails different forms of compensation like relative security and career opportunities. ¹⁰ (: 208). In the ESeC version of Goldthope's scheme, the nine classes are

A further modified version of the EGP scheme have been created by Daniel Oesch (2006a; 2006b), with the ambition to take several contemporary changes in the employment structure into account. According to Oesch, three labor market trends have made the EGP scheme, which was conceptualized during high industrialism, slightly outdated. The first trend is the sectorshift of the economy, i.e. the expansion of the service sector on behalf of the manufacturing sector; the second is the gender-shift, through which women are increasingly participating in paid employment; and the third concerns the education-shift caused by rising education levels (Oesch 2006a: 27). According to Oesch, the result is a swelling middle class that the EGP scheme cannot handle properly. His alternative class scheme introduces a horizontal distinction between three different work logics, whereas EGP (and ESeC) only has a single hierarchical dimension of service and labor contract. The three work logics are the organizational, the technical and the interpersonal work logic (Oesch 2006a: 64). The self-employed and the

employers are thought of as instances of a fourth independent work logic. The resulting class scheme can be used in either a 17-class or 8-class version (for the 8-class version, see Table 6).

Chapter 6: Adaptations

This section displays track of all the changes that have been made to questions in the many different questionnaires and factsheets throughout the project.

The structure of this section is as follows: for every type of questionnaire/factsheet, we list the changes made to questions and thus variables.

BEFORE DEMONSTRATION

AFO: Factsheet Organization before demonstration

No changes have been made.

AQO: Questionnaire Organization before demonstration

- For the demonstrations from [ID] 84 through 97, a dummy variable was added to the input screen, asking whether the country team was able to contact organizers. If a team was unable to reach an organizer, they we asked to create an interview sheet for the interviewer, click 'no' to the question 'Did your team have any contact with an organizer with regard to this demonstration?', and write a rationale in the final "add comments" box of the questionnaire.
- Q7: 'Who is politically responsible for the issue? At which political level is the political competence to deal with the issue situated?' has two answer category forms in the data store. Initially it was a closed question (answers: local, regional, national, European, international or other...), allowing teams to select only one political level. Later on another question form was added with every political level as a dummy variable (0/1) allowing teams to select more than one political level.
- Questions about attention and position by politicians on the issue of the demonstration according to organizers were dropped, and moved to CFI.
- For the demonstrations from [ID] 45 through 97, 'mirroring'-questions on organization-police interaction were added to AQO and AQP. For AQO this meant that two questions were added:
 - Q17 (Did your organization have prior contact with the police on how the demonstration was to be conducted? (ORG_polcontA) If yes, how would you describe the climate of these conversations? (ORG_polcontB).
 - Q18 (Did the police set certain conditions for the conduction of the demonstration? (ORG_conditc) If yes, please specify which conditions (ORG_conditcom). The previous Question 17 (ORG_polreactA + ORG_polreactAcom) became Q19. Question 18 (ORG_polreactB + ORG_polreactBcom) became Q20. Q19 (ORG_atmo_before) became Q21.

AQP: Questionnaire Police before demonstration

• For the demonstrations from [ID] 64 through 97, a dummy variable was added to the input screen, asking whether the country team was able to contact the police.

- For the demonstrations from [ID] 45 through 97, and discussions with the Italian country team that had recently joined the CCC project, 'mirroring'-questions on organization-police interaction were added to AQO and AQP. For AQP this meant that five questions were added:

DURING DEMONSTRATION

BQC: Core Questionnaire

- For the demonstrations from [ID] 45 through 97, Q6 was slightly changed. Whereas initially 'friends and/or relatives' was one company variable, they are separated now. Important: note that *relatives* has the variable label 'q06comp4' and *friends* has 'q06comp8'. Always use the latest version of any syntax. In appendix you can find a list of all demonstrations and whether they used the old inclusive, or the new divided form of the variable. For demonstrations with the old version, the two separate friends and relatives dummies now both get the score '1' in the data store.
- For the demonstrations from [ID] 45 through 97, 'United Nations' was added as an extra category to Q26 measuring institutional trust.
- The first socio demo question about gender has been adapted for the LGBT demo's. To keep the export manageable, the adaptations of the gender questionnaire were included as an extra question in the optional module. Subsequently, there are three versions of the gender question. In each demonstration one of these options was used: (1) the dummy 'male/female' version; (2) a 'male, female, other please specify' version, and (3) an open question "which is your gender identity" followed by the closed question "which is your juridical/birth gender?" (male, female, do not want to answer).
