The full enjoyment of a wide range of human rights, including the rights to health, food, water and sanitation, and ultimately the right to life, relies on the existence of a safe, clean, healthy and sustainable environment. Since the Stockholm Declaration of 1972, the debate about integrating environmental concerns with human rights protection has become much more intense. In May 2015, Pope Francis released his Encyclical Letter *Laudato Si'* on Care for Our Common Home to much acclaim, addressing, *inter alia*, the relationship between the natural environment and respect for human rights.

This workshop will bring together scholars and policy makers to discuss the place of the environment in the international human rights regime and reflect upon prospective solutions to the environmental problems which affect the enjoyment of fundamental rights. In this respect, the panels will discuss the link between climate change, water issues and human rights, as well as possible responses to the global inequality caused by environmental degradation.
