Research focus: analysis of the grounds of officeholders' contestatory reactions to deficits of office accountability as indicative of a lack of endogenous institutional trustworthiness

Problem

Dysfunctional public institutions are not trustworthy



How may officeholders mutually trust their interrelated conduct to sustain the working of their institution?

Conjecture

Public institutions realizing office accountability are endogenously trustworthy because their internal architecture grounds officeholders' mutual trust that their interrelated action sustains the working of the institution -> constitutive relation between office accountability and endogenous institutional trustworthiness

Method

Study *a negativo* of officeholders' reactions to institutional dysfunctions (e.g. corruption as contestatory action) as they offer a special insight about the relation between (deficits of) office accountability and (the lack of) endogenous institutional trustworthiness



Analysis of the various kinds of the mixed moral feelings (e.g., self-righteousness, anger, guilt or shame), more or less fittingly, associated with officeholders' contestatory reactions to institutional failures -> mobilization of internal resources of self-correction through officeholders' interrelated action
