# Global History Lab World history from 1300 to the present

# Professor Jeremy Adelman, Princeton University

The Global History Lab makes it possible to study our past in a classroom without walls, working with learners from different cultures and social backgrounds. Princeton professor Jeremy Adelman will offer the Global History Lab as a combined course, including students enrolled on the Princeton campus and as a MOOC on EdX for students worldwide.

## Quote from Jeremy:

"I am very excited about this course. While I have taught MOOCs several times before, now I will have an opportunity to learn from others! One theme of the course is that events and processes of the past mean different things to different people – what better way to capture these perspectives than in group labs, where students will collaborate on projects and share their insights and findings with the rest."

#### Here are some key features of the course:

- Two weekly one-hour lectures (on-line)
- A textbook and a selection of primary documents to allow learners to apply what they learn (made available in the field)
- Opportunities to collaborate in teams on short assignments every two weeks (mixed teams including students from Princeton, University of Geneva, Kakuma and Azraq refugee camps, and refugee learners from Amman)
- Open forum discussions with students worldwide on pressing themes in global history with a special focus on the history of migration and statelessness

The GHL encourages learners to work with peers around the world on primary historical materials – to learn about the past by applying the craft of the historian. The course covers the span of world history from 1300 to the present. Major themes include: the history of science and health, trade and war, and migration and statelessness, and the changing human environment. The course is twelve weeks long, with a pause halfway through (October).







## What do you need?

- Curiosity about history and world affairs
- Interest in collaborating and learning with others
- Proficiency in English (all lectures include Arabic transcripts)
- Approximately 10-15 hours of study, peer collaboration and tutor interaction per course week

#### What will you receive?

- A course text book, all learning materials
- Support from on-site e-learning facilitators and on-line tutors, and from your professor
- Access to computer lab at the InZone Hub during the course
- A Verified Certificate (this course runs on edX)
- All students who pass the final examination will receive 3 European Credit Transfer and Accumulation Credits (ECTS) issued by the University of Geneva as part of its partnership with Princeton University
