

Description

Literary Multilingualism Scholarship has for a long time discussed how to define its actual object: Is it 'multilingual texts'—and if so, how do we define what counts as 'multilingual'? Is one to include texts that make use of dialects or sociolects? How about texts that simply subvert the integrity of a language, such as Georges Perec's novel *La disparition* (1969) which makes no use of the letter E? This lecture and workshop follow Brigitte Rath's suggestion of the term 'nonmonolingualism' (Rath 2017). After all, what interests us most in so-called multilingual texts, or in texts like Perec's, is how they subvert what Yasemin Yildiz calls the "monolingual paradigm" (Yildiz 2012): the notion that it is the norm for persons as well as for texts (or, indeed, for any utterance) to exist 'in one language only'. Looking at nonmonolingualism in literary texts therefore means to detect structural elements which go against this very notion—such as, for example, the workings of wit and paronomasia. One can even go so far as to argue that all texts are in some sense nonmonolingual—which, if accepted, could make nonmonolingualism a truly new paradigm for Literary Studies.

This lecture and workshop will be led in English by **Till Dembeck**, an Associate Professor in German Literature and Media Didactics at the University of Luxembourg. Over the last years, his work has largely focused on literary multilingualism: he has notably co-edited the compendium *Literatur und Mehrsprachigkeit* and is a founding member of the editorial board of the *Journal of Literary Multilingualism*. In 2023, he published *Der Ton der Kultur. Lyrik und Sprachforschung im 19. Jahrhundert*, a book on 19th century lyric poetry and linguistics. Till Dembeck is currently working on a book manuscript concerning the ongoing Ethification of the Digital.
