Being, Truth, and Knowledge in Ancient Greek Logic

Topic

The concepts of being, truth, and knowledge are tightly connected in ancient Greek

philosophy, especially in Aristotle and in Hellenistic philosophy. There appears to be a shift

of perspective between Aristotle and the Hellenistic philosophical schools (Stoics,

Epicureans, and Academics) that took center stage shortly after his death. While for Aristotle

the concept of essence is at the centre of the web where being, truth, and knowledge are

reciprocally linked, it remains unclear (and debated) what, if anything, plays the role of

essence in Hellenistic philosophy. Moreover, Aristotle appears to take for granted that

knowledge is possible and attainable, while skepticism becomes a philosophical issue in

Hellenistic philosophy. This workshop, whose purpose is to shed light on this shift both from

a historical and from a theoretical point of view, will bring together some established scholars

and some more junior researchers.
