Data collection

- A major cornerstone of the report, but also part of the OECD broader efforts to:
 - Enhance the coverage and quality of the OECD statistics on financing for sustainable development beyond ODA
 - Get a better understanding of the 'big picture' of resource flows to developing countries
- Structured in two questionnaires:
 - Data questionnaire (applying OECD statistical standards)
 - Qualitative questionnaire
- Conducted by the OECD Network of Foundations Working for Development (netFWD) and OECD Development Co-operation Directorate


USD 24 billion of giving in 2013-15 by 143 foundations **Europe United States** 17% 74% **Elsewhere** 9%

- Highlights how much foundations contribute to development
- Looks at how foundations partner with other developing actors, such as governments, donors and nongovernmental organisations
- Challenges what we think we know about foundations and development




Philanthropy is relatively modest when compared to ODA...




2013-2015 average, current prices

...but key in some sectors, such as health






Health is by far the main sector foundations give to, mainly because of Gates




Philanthropic giving is rather concentrated

BMGF = 49%


Top 20 = 81%




Africa is the main beneficiary region




India is the main beneficiary country



2/3 of funds go to middle-income countries




Foundations invest through well-known large organisations







Only a few foundations provide core or un-earmarked funding




Long-term commitments are quite rare

Foundations are very cautious about sharing data






Foundations are only starting to invest in impact evaluations
